

Now we offer five shows (including the Youth Players' summer production) and most often that means forty performances for which tickets can be sold. So the Board of Directors is asking Judy to be responsible for the season ticket reservations only and will require each production to supply its own ticket manager, but for old times sake, she is handling *Three for Gin* for us anyway.

She also served a couple of terms as our president, served on the Board several times and performed more acts of service because of good nature than any of us can remember. BIOGRAPHIES

BOB ACKROYD (Martin Pepper) — Bob has directed 6 Rms. Riv Vu, A Man for All Seasons, The Lion in Winter, Prelude, and has appeared at the NFCT in The Rope Dancers, The Country Girl, Arsenic and Old Lace, Dark of the Moon, A Thousand Clowns, The Odd Couple, Spoon River Anthology, Anatomy of a Murder, See How They Run, Finian's Rainbow, Jack in a Box, Auntie Mame, Little Moon of Alban, Prelude, The Little Foxes, and created the unmemorable role of Vito Pasquale Stromboli in Inherit the Wind, winning the coveted Spelvin Award for the least contribution by an actor in an inconsequential role.

BOB CULHANE (Henry Potter) — Bob lives in Hampton Bays with his wife, Joan, plus children and a dog called Peanuts. A graduate of Pace University, he majored in Marketing and now has his own insurance office in East Northport. Bob has appeared in Plaza Suite as father of the bride and also in Don't Drink the Water as Walter with the Hampton Bays Players. This is his first appearance with the NFCT. JANET FREEMAN (Charlotte Potter) — Janet has been an active member of the NFCT for nearly 20 years. She has been seen in Auntie Mame and 40 Carats. She has produced Spoon River Anthology, Prelude, Lion in Winter, among others. However, Janet is best known for costuming. JACQUELYN JAMES OSTUNI (Mrs. Brewster) — Although this is her first appearance with the NFCT, Jacquie has had extensive training in theatre, dance, music, and voice, and has appeared in community, dinner, and summer stock theatre. During the day, she works as an actress and model. Jacquie is married to a Suffolk County Police Officer, Fred, and they have a son, Thomas, who is also an actor and model. She also teaches dance and exercise.

LAURIE ROBERTS (Sarah Pepper) — Laurie has appeared in the NFCT productions of *Desk Set* and *Anatomy of a Murder*. She resides in Aquebogue with her husband, Dick, and their twins, the M&M's, Mark and Maureen. An active member of the NFCT, Laurie is now on the Board, and she loves Yoga and tennis.

HOW IT ALL BEGAN

In the Fall of 1956, a small newspaper advertisement appeared in the pages of *The Suffolk Times*. It said, in effect, "Wanted – people interested in starting an amateur theatre. Meet in the basement of the Floyd Memorial Library, Greenport" and a date was given. A small but eager group came together to meet Jim and Doris MacCammond, then living in Orient, who had placed the advertisement. Jim was an art instructor at the Greenport School. Doris had graduate training in dramatics and speech. They were experienced and skilled – well qualified to organize a play group.

At that time the Orient Play Shop, which had been active for seven or eight years up to 1954, was inactive. The Greenport Teachers' Association was interested in a fund raising event for May 1957, so the fledgling theatre group and the teachers joined forces.

Students and faculty of Greenport School and community members from Southold to Orient gathered together to put on *The Man Who Came to Dinner*. The original choice for the lead role was unable to complete his assignment, so Jim MacCammond played Sheridan Whiteside and Doris directed the production. Lighting and stage settings were improvised to fit the somewhat odd dimensions of the high school stage.

The new theatre activity drew members from all along the North Fork. Scientists and others, from the then relatively new Plum Island Laboratory, teachers, members of Orient Play Shop combined to produce Harvey, directed by Dorothy Robertson, and Bus Stop directed by Connie Overton. These were produced in Greenport. The affairs of the group became more organized. We elected our first president, George Cottral of Greenport, and a year later moved forward to formal incorporation.

The North Fork Community Theatre next staged Visit to a Small Planet, All My Sons, and Romanoff and Juliet. More people had joined the group, bringing talents which contributed to successful shows. However, the Greenport High School stage was unwieldy and our production problems had to be dovetailed into school schedules. We moved to Orient where the small stage and more intimate auditorium of Mechanic's Hall served us well for Night Must Fall and Born Yesterday.

In the Winter of 1960 Mr. James Moreno came to see our shows in Orient and told us he would equip and open a professional summer theater in Mattituck. This was our opportunity for a theater home. We moved to Mattituck in the Fall of 1961 and opened with *The Glass Menagerie*, directed by Frederic Newell.

She has been seen in Angel Street, Inherit the Wind, Last of the Red Hot Lovers, and, with only a week's notice, had the lead in Anatomy of a Murder. Priscilla is also the NFCT Secretary.

ART WILKS (Arthur Goodleaf) — Art, a teacher of Earth Sciences in Southold, lives there with his wife, two daughters, one son, and a black Labrador named Sod. Recently, he obtained his private pilot's certification, and he enjoys cutting and splitting wood for his parlor furnace. Since Damn Yankees Art has been involved with the NFCT — that makes him just about old enough to do this part without makeup! He enjoys the therapy of working on a play, and finds the part particularly interesting as it seems to be the older counterpart of his favorite past role — Bronny in The Peanut Butter Prince.

JED CLAUSS (Director) — Jed's best productions were Kip and Jason followed by Pirates of Penzance and Inherit the Wind. Last
