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Theatre lighting can be a tricky business. Besides simple illumination of the stage and performers, lighting can set a mood, convey information, add emphasis to a scene, heighten the drama, and enhance the set. To achieve all of this requires the joint efforts of a director, a lighting designer and staff. Basically, the director indicates to the designer the various effects he or she wishes to achieve in the play's many scenes. It is the designer's job to be familiar with the available lighting equipment and to set the lights properly. This often means climbing ladders to adjust light positions to avoid or create shadows or to add color to the basic lights, which can "cool" or "warm" a stage setting. The lighting staff is responsible for running the light board at the settings indicated by the designer. A steady hand is needed to make the smooth transitions required between light changes. Most of our shows use a staff of at least two - one to read the designer's directions and one to actually perform the light changes.

Few plays require simple illumination. Most often, lights play a larger part in the action. A play of murder or suspense may find its drama heightened by the subtle or not-so-subtle effects of lights. Fade-outs, black-outs, dimmed lights or hints of color can add to the tension of such a production.

Lights can also help focus audience attention on the action. In productions on a small stage such as ours, it is often necessary to create more than one room or set on stage. Lights can keep the eye from wandering by highlighting one section of the stage and dimming or blacking out other stage areas.

Because many of our sets are donated or borrowed from the community, we don't always get *exactly* what we would like. Colors, textures, or wear and tear of furniture can be minimized or enhanced through the use of lights.

Some productions take place over a period of time – a day, a week, or through the seasons. Lights help indicate morning, evening, stormy or sunny weather, a late winter afternoon, a summer night, etc.

So, as you can see, lights are an important part of our theatre. We would like to take this opportunity to thank all of those people who have worked with our lights over the past 35 years.

As space allows, we will write about various production jobs (Make-up, props, costumes, etc) in future programs.

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
